



## GARDENING MAINTANCE TIPS FOR PLANTING & GROWING MARIGOLDS

Planting and growing marigolds in your Southern California garden can bring vibrant colors and a cheerful atmosphere. Here are some care and maintenance tips to ensure your marigolds thrive:
